UN OCEAN CONFERENCE Save our Ocean, Protect our Future

The Ocean Conference, co-hosted by the Governments of Kenya and Portugal, came at a critical time as the world is seeking to address many of the deep-rooted problems of our societies laid bare by the COVID-19 pandemic and which will require major structural transformations and common shared solutions that are anchored in the SDGs.

To mobilize action, the Conference sought to propel much needed sciencebased innovative solutions aimed at starting a new chapter of global ocean action.



27 JUNE

UN Secretary-General António Guterres opened the Conference, offering four recommendations for addressing the ocean emergency: invest in sustainable ocean economies for food and renewable energy; use the ocean as a model for how to manage global problems for the greater good; protect the ocean and people whose lives and livelihoods depend on them; and invest in early warning systems to protect coastal communities



28 JUNE

Promoting and strengthening sustainable ocean-based economies, in particular for SIDS and **LDCs**: Co-chaired dialogue by the Minister of Climate and the Environment, Norway, and the Minister of the Sea of Cabo Verde



29 IUNE

Ocean acidification, deoxygenation and ocean warming: Co-chaired dialogue by the US Special Presidential Envoy for Climate, and the Office of the Prime Minister of Jamaica



30 IUNE

Increasing scientific knowledge and developing research capacity and transfer of marine technology: Co-chaired dialogue the Minister of Ecological Transition and Territorial Cohesion, France and the Minister of Environment and Energy, Costa Rica



1 JULY

Leveraging interlinkages between SDG 14 and other Goals towards the implementation of the **2030 Agenda:** Co-chaired by the Deputy Prime Minister for Climate Policies and Minister of Environment and Waters, Bulgaria, and the Minister of Health, Wellness and the Environment, Antigua and Barbuda
