Coastal region on the trans-European transport network with Liverpool and Belfast.

Diverse multinational base of global companies, young and talented workforce, renewed focus on growing indigenous economy.

Our region contributes greater than 50% of national GDP

36 elected representatives on the Eastern and Midland Regional Assembly Nationally - 9 fulltime Committee of the Regions delegates

EMRA Projects

- Celtic Seas Partnership (2014) In order to deliver the ambitions of the MSFD, effective approaches that link Integrated Coastal Zone Management and MSFD objectives are required
- RESILENS (2015)- Exploring ways to make our critical infrastructure more resilient to human and natural threats
- *Urb-ADAPT (2016)* will allow for the integrated assessment and management of current and future climate vulnerabilities across the GDA






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AAP Priorities

Atlantic Action Plan

- Numerous areas for potential collaboration
- Common priorities, not least sustained and sustainable growth
- Informed evidence based decision making required and a joined-up approach to funding mechanisms in order to implement EU policy and satisfy shared opportunities

- INTERREG Atlantic Area Programme

Some considerations

- Geographical scope of calls;
- Priority areas within calls;
- Timing of calls;
- Matching to our areas of interest and expertise.

Atlantic Area Programme

- Programme could be very relevant.
- The Atlantic Area Programme provides assistance to transnational co-operation projects in Ireland, Western UK, Portugal and designated coastal regions of Spain and France. For the 2014-2020 period the programme area also includes the Azores, Canary islands and Madeira.
- Assist with implementing Priority 4 of the Atlantic Action Plan.
- €140 million (€m) euro of funds.
- Anticipated budget per project of €1.5m-€2m.
- First call in 2016.



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
